Black Pine Circle History By: Callie Fulop

A lot of us were there at BPC's 50th birthday Party. But how did BPC get to where it is now? Well in 1967, three hardworking people came up with the idea of BPC. They then got it up and running! Their names were Oscar Pemantle, Francis Kandl, and Carman Gonzalez. In 1968 Black Pine Circle opened workshops for college students. At the time, the school was located in the high Sierras, whose big pine trees gave Black Pine Circle its name. In 1971, workshops opened for elementary and middle school students who were not being sufficiently challenged at school. In 1973, BPC's first official kindergarten class started, located in a Seventh Day Adventist Church. It quickly expanded into a full-scale elementary school, and eventually middle school as well. Many people say that this was when BPC "started", but we know better, don't we? Two years later, in 1975, the Lower School building was purchased and all of BPC's operations moved there. BPC ran things smoothly there for nine years before they bought the Upper School building from Tehiyah Day School in 1984.

We all love to read, don't we? Well, the library wasn't always there! That building has only been open to students since 2005. Later in 2005, Mr. Carlstroem became the Head of School. Wow—that was 18 years ago!

In 2011, the climbing wall on the Upper School campus was put in. Mr. Carlstroem made a good change, if you ask me!

Now don't tell me you don't like running around on the field! That was created in 2014. And in 2016 the Q Lab, a space for science and inquiry (cont. on page 4)



Chocolate Chip Cookie Bars By Elizabeth Ham 3rd Grade

Ingredients Cooking Spray 2 sticks of unsalted butter at room temperature 1 cup of granulated sugar 1 cup of packed light brown sugar 3 large eggs 1 ½ teaspoons of pure vanilla extract 3 cups of all-purpose flour ¾ teaspoons of baking soda ¾ teaspoons of salt 1 12-ounce bag of semi-sweet chocolate chips

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Line a 9 – by-13 inch baking pan with foil, leaving a 2-inch overhang on two sides. Coat the foil with cooking spray. Combine the butter, granulated sugar and brown sugar in a large bowl. Beat with a mixer on medium-high speed until light and fluffy, about two minutes. Beat in the eggs and vanilla. Reduce speed to low and add the flour, baking soda and salt; beat until combined. Stir in the chocolate chips with a wooden spoon.
- Spread the dough in the pan with a rubber spatuala or press with damp or oiled fingers. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 35-40 minutes. Remove the pan from the oven with oven mitts, then put the pan on a rack and let them cool completely.

Cookies Continued... 3. Lift the bars out of the pan using the overhang foil, then peel off the foil. Cut into squares.
